

Senate Appropriations Committee

• Senator Collins is the first Mainer in 92 years to lead the powerful Appropriations Committee.

• The last Mainer to hold the chair position on the Senate Appropriations Committee was Senator Frederick Hale in 1933.

• She is also the first Republican woman to Chair the Committee.

About the Appropriations Committee

• The Senate Appropriations Committee is the largest committee in the U.S. Senate, consisting of 29 members in the 119th Congress. Its role is defined by the U.S. Constitution, which requires "appropriations made by law" prior to the expenditure of any money from the Federal treasury.

• The Committee writes the legislation that allocates federal funds to the numerous government agencies, departments, and organizations on an annual basis.

About the Appropriations Committee (cont.)

• The Committee has 12 subcommittees that are tasked with drafting legislation to allocate discretionary funding to government agencies within their jurisdictions. These subcommittees are responsible for reviewing the President's budget request, hearing testimony from government officials and other witnesses, and drafting the spending plans for the coming fiscal year.

• The Committee is also responsible for supplemental spending bills, which are sometimes needed in the middle of a fiscal year to compensate for emergency expenses.

Overview of Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) Process

- The annual appropriations process has provided opportunities for Members of Congress to advocate for funding to address the needs of their states and local communities through Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) in the Senate and Community Project Funding (CPF) in the House.
- These projects become part of the annual government funding bills, or Appropriations bills, authored by Congress and signed into law by the President.

CDS Process (cont.)

- The Committee issues guidance on request eligibility. Each Senator then creates his or her own applications with questions for organizations seeking to apply for funds.
- Project guidance and eligibility has varied year to year and the House Appropriations Committee guidance may differ from that of the Senate Appropriations Committee guidance.
 - For example, the House Appropriations Committee has imposed a 15-request maximum per Representative. The Senate has not had a request maximum.

CDS Process (cont.)

- Only nonprofits and state and local governments are eligible to apply for CDS funding.
- Requests are subject to certain Committee and federal guidelines.
- Senators review the requests they received and then advance requests by submitting them to the Appropriations Committee.
- Not every project submitted by a member may move forward or be incorporated into legislation.

Senator Collins and CDS

- Senator Collins has secured more than \$1 billion for hundreds of Maine projects in <u>FY 2022</u>, <u>FY 2023</u>, and <u>FY 2024</u> appropriations legislation across all 16 Counties.
- For FY25, Senator Collins has advanced a large number of important projects throughout the state. These projects are included in the FY25 Appropriations bills that are tied to congressional funding negotiations.







Timeline

- Once we have received all of the applications, our office and Senator Collins herself will vet the proposals.
- After about a month following the submission deadline, you will know if your project has advanced and been submitted to the Senate Appropriations Committee.
- It takes about a full calendar year to a year and a half between the time an applicant applies and should the applicant and project advance through the Appropriations Committee and legislative process begin working with the federal agency to execute an agreement and start drawing down the funds.

Timeline (cont.)

- Once the bills are drafted (with CDS projects), Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee will markup their bills and vote on them (typically in the summer). A majority of Senators on the Committee must vote to advance each bill.
- Bills are then referred to the full Senate for votes, subject to amendments.
- The Senate and House then "conference" each bill and reconcile any differences, which then generates new bills that must be approved by both chambers.
- Once approved by Congress, the bills are sent to the President to be signed into law.

Important Highlights

- It is important to note that when the bills are signed into law, recipients do not receive a check in the mail. Recipients have to work with the federal agency to draw down the funds. This process is similar to that of a regular federal grant.
- Funds may <u>not</u> be used to reimburse for projects already constructed/acquired or projects that will be completed before the passage of the final bill.
- Requesting organizations must be a nonprofit or state/local government. Project purposes must also be in line with Committee guidance.

Important Highlights (cont.)

• Matching Funds: Some accounts require that the requesting organizations have a percentage match towards the proposal (20%, 25%, 50%). Even if there is not a requirement, we like to see that the requesting entity has some skin in the game. Does the organization have a plan for securing the match?

Federal Compliance:

- Environmental and Historical Reviews
- Build America, Buy America Requires that all iron, steel, manufactured products and construction materials must be produced in the US. This applies to the entirety of the project, not just what the CDS funds are going to be used for.

Proposal Considerations

• Use of Funds: How will the funds actually be spent?

• **Sustainability**: If awarded CDS funding, how will the project become self-sustaining?

• **Job Creation**: What is the economic benefit of the project?

• Outside Approval: Will the project, a local match, or any component be subject to approval vote or referendum by the town, city, etc.

Ineligible Requests

CDS funding may not be used for the following activities:

- ➤ Salaries, stipends/overhead costs We have found that CDS applications for hard infrastructure are most likely to advance through this highly competitive process but applications for salaries, personnel costs and stipends, are rarely successful.
- ➤ K-12 School Construction
- > Fire Trucks
- > Proven energy technology (solar panels, EV charging stations)
- > Broadband
- > Debt or loan repayment
- > CDS funds may **not** be used to reimburse funds for projects already constructed or acquired.

Looking Ahead

- We are currently operating under a Continuing Resolution (CR) that expires on March $14^{\rm th}$ and are hopeful that the Congress is able to pass the FY 2025 Appropriations bills prior to that date.
- Senator Collins is working with her Appropriations Committee counterparts to get the FY 2025 funding bills across the finish line.
- There are a lot of decisions that have to be made before we can confirm that there will be a CDS program for FY 2026.
